Biography

Andrew Moravcsik is Professor of Politics and Director of the European Union Program at Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School. From 1992 to 2004, he held similar positions at Harvard University. He has authored over 100 scholarly works on European integration, transatlantic relations, international organization and politics, defense-industrial globalization, and global human rights. His history of the European Union, The Choice for Europe, has been called "the most important work in the field" (American Historical Review). He is currently working Asian regional cooperation, as well as European topics, for which he is on leave in Shanghai during the academic year 2007-2008. He is a Non-Resident Senior Fellow of the Brookings Institution and a regular columnist for Newsweek and Prospect magazines, and has published over 100 commentaries and policy analyses in the Financial Times, Foreign Affairs and elsewhere. He has served as trade negotiator for the US government, special assistant to the Deputy Prime Minister of the Republic of Korea, press official for the European Commission, editor of a Washington foreign policy journal, and member of various policy commissions. He holds a BA from Stanford, an MA from Johns Hopkins (SAIS), and a PhD from Harvard University, as well as having attended German and French universities. He writes regularly on classical music for the Financial Times, Opera, Opera News, Newsweek and other publications, and conducts scholarly research on opera history and performance. He lives in Princeton, NJ, with his wife Anne-Marie Slaughter and his two sons
